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Reported speech

- > In reported speech (also called *indirect speech*) we report what was said.
- > The most common verbs used for this are say, tell, ask.
- > There are tense changes (back-shifting) and structure rules, which generally apply

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Time referfences

- ✓ In reported **yes/no questions**, we use asked + if/whether + the same word order as in a statement e.g. "Did you turn off the lights?"

 She <u>asked if I</u> had turned off the lights.
- ✓ In reported **requests**, we useasked + object + infinitivee.g. "Could you please turn off the lights"
- She <u>asked me to turn off</u> the lights.
- ✓ In reported imperatives, we use told + object + infinitive
 e.g. "Turn off the lights!"
 He told me to turn off the lights.
